

- · Greater collaboration with Japan and South Korea regarding China
- · Partnering with the EU in a possible resumption of nuclear negotiations with Iran
- · Continued focus on human rights violations and corresponding Global Magnitsky Sanctions
- A rolling back of certain restrictions on Cuba.
- An expectation of continuity on policy and sanctions relating to North Korea and Venezuela
