



Data Security Law

Though the U.S. has not passed legislation dealing solely with <u>data security law</u>, organizations are expected to safeguard sensitive information and establish privacy policies. Legislation addressing specific types of sensitive data is found within various U.S. laws, such as the Gramm-Leach-Bliley Act.

The <u>Federal Trade Commission</u> Act may investigate "deceptive acts," including when a website does not follow its stated privacy policy. The FTC provides recommendations to help developers follow security guidelines. The following laws also have components to help protect private information:

- Fair Credit Reporting Act outlines the proper use and disposal of credit report information.
- Federal Information Security Management Act requires federal agencies and their contractors to have secure IT systems and U.S. data storage.
- Children's online information is protected by Children's Online Privacy Protection Act.
- Several state laws also mandate specific levels of data security for personal information.

Many states now legally require organizations to notify consumers of security breaches involving personal data.
